CJS began a litter control program in July 2006. Offenders are assigned a section of County roadway for their community service. Offenders completed the following for FY11:


**\*32.94 tons of trash picked up** (CJS is using an average weight of 17 lbs per bag and **3,875 bags** were picked up)

**\*1,105 miles of roads cleaned**

**\*3,445 hours of credit given for community service**

**\*129 tires picked up**

**Since July 2006, a total of 6,049 miles of Culpeper roads were cleaned and 163.03 tons of trash were removed. That is 326,060 pounds of trash!!!**

# Culpeper County Criminal Justice Services

## Program Overview & Mission Statement

Culpeper County Criminal Justice Services (CJS) provides local probation supervision to jailable misdemeanor offenders and non-violent felon offenders. Our Mission Statement is as follows:

*The Culpeper County Criminal Justice Services Program is committed to developing, establishing and maintaining community-based corrections programs that hold offenders accountable by providing sanctions, services and alternatives to incarceration, while providing leadership and coordination throughout the entire criminal justice system.*

## Cost/Benefit Analysis

Local Probation Supervision is a far less expensive option than jail. It should be noted that not all offenders are appropriate for CJS placement and CJS is certainly not designed or meant to alleviate the need for incarceration. In FY 2011, it cost the County approximately \$80 a day to incarcerate an inmate in the Culpeper County Jail. During this same time period, it cost \$3.54 a day for CJS to supervise an offender. This is a cost savings to the County of \$76.46 per offender per day.

Offenders referred to CJS are allowed to remain in the community under supervision. Rather than filling jails, they work, attend school, receive treatment, and pay taxes, child support, restitution, court costs and fines.

## Evidence-Based Practices

CJS continues to move toward evidence-based practices.

All staff have been trained in Effective Communications/Motivational Strategies, EC/MS, and determined to be competent. The Director is a certified EC/MS trainer and conducted training for many officers throughout the Commonwealth on behalf of the Virginia Community Criminal Justice Association, VCCJA. CJS staff continue to pilot the MOST and OST assessment tools to determine risk and needs of offenders. The Director and Local Probation Officer Rhonda Ford were trained in FY11 in an evidence-based group called Moral Reconnection Therapy, MRT. In FY 12, they will begin conducting MRT groups for offenders identified with antisocial cognition.
