




Risk Level and Deferment Data

Program Overview & Mission Statement

Culpeper County Criminal Justice Services (CJS) provides local probation supervision to misdemeanor offenders and non-violent felon offenders.

The mission of the Culpeper County Criminal Justice Services Program is to increase public safety by providing probation services and sanctions that hold offenders accountable for their actions and reduce the risk of recidivism.

CJS Litter Control Program

Offenders completed the following for FY14:

***12.94 tons of trash picked up** (CJS is using an average weight of 17 lbs. per bag and **1,522 bags** were picked up)

***807 miles of roads cleaned**

***2,422 hours of credit given for community service**

***12 tires picked up**

*** 1 dead cow**

Since July 2006, a total of 8,962 miles of Culpeper roads were cleaned and 224.34 tons of trash were removed. That is 448,680 pounds of trash!

Moral Reconciliation Therapy (MRT) Evaluation

Moral Reconciliation Therapy (MRT) is an evidence-based cognitive-behavioral treatment strategy that addresses antisocial cognition; the number one dynamic risk factor. Research indicates that offenders completing MRT have a 30% reduction in recidivism. MRT is facilitated by CJS staff.

CJS utilizes an assessment tool created by Texas Christian University, the Criminal Thinking Scales (CTS), to assess for placement into MRT. "The 6 CTS scales include entitlement, justification, personal irresponsibility, power orientation, cold heartedness, and criminal rationalization, which represent concepts with special significance in treatment settings for correctional populations." CJS has piloted and places individuals into MRT if they score at or above the 33 percentile in 3 or more of the scales.

CJS began piloting a new assessment tool along with the CTS. The new assessment tool, Criminogenic Cognitions Scale (CCS), was developed by George Mason University. "The 25-item Criminogenic Cognitions Scale (CCS) was designed to tap 5 dimensions: notions of entitlement; failure to accept responsibility; short-term orientation; insensitivity to impact of crime; and negative attitudes toward authority. Results from 552 jail inmates support the reliability, validity, and predictive utility of the measure." CJS will continue to review the CCS.

In FY 2014, 16 individuals began MRT. A review of pre/post test data reveals that 56% of the individuals completing MRT would not qualify for MRT after completion. This suggests a major shift in antisocial cognition. Currently, CJS has 11 individuals enrolled in MRT.
