Dear Citizens:

Greetings from your Board of Supervisors. It can sometimes be a challenge to write this letter each quarter. On the one hand, it is often difficult to anticipate what matters might be most pressing by the time the Culpeper Quarterly actually reaches you. On the other hand, it always pays to be thinking ahead and planning for the future, a trait I think is very important.

We know this quarter that once this issue is delivered, we will be almost ready to finalize the Fiscal Year 2024 Budget. This is a process that takes much of our time and attention, and that of our staff, each and every winter. As part of that process, every two years Culpeper County performs a reassessment of land values. The Department of Real Estate Assessments is responsible for the fair and equitable valuation of real property in Culpeper County. The current assessment became effective January 1, 2021 and remained in effect until January of this year. As has been the case in the past, land values have increased significantly. We know this will be a concern for many of our residents. The Board, as always, will strive to keep taxes low while working to provide the best services and quality of life improvements to our citizens.

We focused a great deal of time and energy in 2022 (and into 2023) on a number of important issues. Some of those are now wrapping up. In February, the Board adopted a new Utility Scale Solar Development Ordinance and an accompanying revised Utility Scale Solar Policy. Having these documents in place will help us to make decisions in the future about the location of prospective solar applications and streamline a complex process of reviewing applications for this specific use. The solar specific caseload that our Planning and Zoning Department has been dealing with for many years has been highly time-consuming and we are glad to have the ordinance and policy in place. The Board also worked to finalize an updated Culpeper County Comprehensive Plan. Our last Comprehensive Plan was adopted in 2015 and we all know how much has changed since then. Our Planning staff worked hard to incorporate public input into this document and while that was hindered by the pandemic, they did an excellent job. Our partnership with the Town of Culpeper to bring Culpeper County its first public pool has also been significantly advanced, with a conceptual design agreed upon and architectural and engineering services authorized to move forward. Our goal is to open the pool in time for the summer season in 2024. A number of things will have to go well in order to realize that expedited process. I am keeping my fingers crossed for another mild winter and for supply chain disruptions to continue to improve.

As a local government, we strive to always act in the best interest of our citizens. While everyone may not agree on what is best, it is our collective community interest that we have at heart. Each and every Board member is committed to governing to the very best of their ability. It is our greatest wish that 2023 will bring many more good things to our community as a whole and to each and every one of our citizens.

#### Learn Computer Numerically Controlled Manufacturing (CNC)

at our local campus at the Carver Center in Culpeper.

If you are interested in computers, 3D printing, and doing things hands-on, then you are in the right place. In six months, you could have the skills to enter into the world of the machinist. If successful, you will operate and program CNC machines that build parts for everything from airplanes to surgical instruments.

New Pathways Tech was formed in 2014 as a result of many ongoing discussions taking place throughout the county regarding the future of technical training, and what should be done. After much discussion with civic groups, industry leaders, and businesses, the conclusion was, that there needed to be a fresh approach. A comprehensive effort that included business, education, and industry, as well as manufacturing.

The input from industry was clear, whatever path we took, it should be a very flexible system to respond to the rapidly changing pace of business. Technology is moving at a faster pace than ever before. In many instances resulting in a loss of, or changing of employment. This meant flexible course curricula for business and flexible starting times for those desiring a new skill set.

In cooperation with Culpeper County, Germanna Community College, surrounding School Systems and DMG MORI, one of the largest makers of CNC equipment in the world, New Pathways Tech was born.

The concept was simple in premise. Build a system that was responsive to individuals who could not wait to begin a new career while at the same time being responsive to the everchanging needs of business. Simple you say?

We became a 501C3 non-profit organization in 2016 and achieved our SCHEV (State Council on Higher Education in Virginia) certification, that every higher education organization must have in order to operate in Virginia. Our machinist credentials are issued by NIMS (National Institute for Metalworking Skills), which are widely accepted throughout the United States.

In 2017 we began our relationship with DMG MORI who liked the idea of flexibility in training courses and flexible start times for students. With the cooperation of Culpeper County, and a partnership with Germanna Community College, the school began its journey. CNC machines and tooling were donated or leased at minimal cost. The outpouring of support from the community, and surrounding counties was amazing.

#### CNC

Today, New Pathways offers training classes to all ages from high school to retired individuals. The classes provide credentials through written and hands on testing in each area of instruction. The environment is friendly and the learning is at your own pace. In many cases funding is largely paid for by programs from the state. State funding does come with a time limit. #### CAD/CAM

New Pathways also has instruction in (Computer Aided Design) using Solid Works, to actually design the work piece. Our instructor Tom Reich (no photo available) is a highly qualified engineer and a passionate teacher who is highly rated by our students. These courses are separate from the CNC instruction.

We are currently working on adding Master Cam (Computer Aided Manufacturing) to our offerings.



#### Culpeper County Chamber of Commerce - 108th Annual Awards Banquet

The Culpeper Chamber of Commerce announced its annual award winners at the 108th Annual Meeting and Awards Banguet Nov. 3, 2022.

Scott Smith and family, who own Ashland Farm, were honored as the Agribusiness of the Year. Smith's family has owned Ashland Farm since 1960 and he has transitioned the farm from dairy to grain. Today Ashland grows approximately 700 acres of soybeans, 400 acres of corn, 150 acres of grass hay, 100 acres of wheat and 86 acres of alfalfa. Smith's sons Andrew and Stone work with him every day and will be the fifth generation of the family to run the farm.

Mountain Run Winery was named the Small Business of the Year. David Foster and his wife Kayti Schumann-Foster opened the Winery in 2016 and have become one of the premier wineries in the state. They opened the Greenlee Tavern in July. Their cider won Best in Show in the wine competition at the 2019 Virginia State Fair. Mountain Run Winery works closely with several nonprofits to host events, including Habitat for Humanity, the Museum of Culpeper History, Mom2Mom, The MS Society and the Culpeper Chamber of Commerce.

Rappahannock Rapidan Community Services was named the Large Business of the Year. The organization serves more than 10,000 people annually in a planning district that includes Culpeper, Fauquier, Madison, Orange and Rappahannock Counties. The agency also celebrated the first anniversary of the SEE Recovery Center – a center that provides a barrier and stigma-free entry point for substance use and behavioral health services.

The Culpeper Mid-Day Lions Club was named the Nonprofit of the Year. In 2022 the Lions helped

more than 350 people get eye exams, glasses and hearing aids. The club also accepts used eyeglasses which can be recycled and used again by someone in need. The Lions have donated \$60,000 to various causes in the past year as well. The Lions have also been working with Winchester-based Trex to recycle plastic and turning it into park benches.

Kirstan Knipple, who started the nonprofit Mom2Mom, was named the 2022 Young Professional of the Year. Knipple and Mom2Mom last year gave away 5,000 diapers in the region along with wipes, formula and hygiene products. Knipple said her resourcefulness led her to starting Mom2Mom and helping families in need. The nonprofit has two give aways each month, one in Culpeper and one in Orange. A single mom of a daughter, 13, and a son, 8, Knipple lives in Culpeper.

Donny Thompson was named the Entrepreneur of the Year. Thompson, owner of Thompson Auto Repair, started working on automobiles out of his backyard garage before transitioning to a garage in Brandy Station. He now services approximately 200 vehicles a month. Thompson Auto Repair offers a variety of services, including auto repair, general maintenance, engine and transmission replacements, tire replacements, alignments and state inspections.

Charles "Junior" Perryman was named the L.B. Henretty Outstanding Citizen. The longtime volunteer firefighter has been serving Culpeper County since 1983 and is the President of the Culpeper County Volunteer Fire and Rescue Association. He has been deputy fire chief at Culpeper County Volunteer Fire Department Co. 1 since 2013 and is an adjunct instructor for Virginia firefighters and vice chair of the local emergency planning committee. In the nomination letter written by his daughter Karah Thompson, his dedication to the community was noted. "Christmas, birthdays, sporting events, every cookout, if the tones dropped my dad didn't hesitate and was out the door with a kiss on the forehead and a, 'be back soon."

# Community Partnerships Allow Culpeper Students to get a "Start on Success"

Culpeper County Public Schools (CCPS) is working with local businesses and community partners to implement the "Start on Success" (SOS) School to Work Program. This program is a highly structured school-to-work program for at-risk high school juniors and seniors with an Individualized Education Program (IEP). The students in the program are pursuing a standard or advanced studies diploma.

The CCPS Start on Success program is a collaboration coordinated by the VCU Center on Transition Innovations (CTI), Culpeper County Public Schools, the Virginia Department of Education (VDOE), the Department of Aging and Rehabilitative Services (DARS) and local businesses. In the program, students learn how to build and strengthen their employment skills by applying the skills and knowledge taught in the classroom while working in a paid internship with a local business.

CCPS Special Education Transition Specialist Kim Bledsoe said, "The students in the Start on Success School to Work Program benefit in many ways through the collaboration with a local business. I have seen the students become confident in their skills and abilities on the job. They apply soft skills discussed in the classroom and confidently apply new skills at school and on the job."

CCPS started this program during the 2021-2022 school year. The first group of students worked in a variety of settings. One student worked with mentors at Battlefield Auto Group in the detailing and building maintenance department, learning how to run equipment, and the importance of maintaining the facilities. Four others worked at A.G. Richardson Elementary School and Culpeper Middle School with mentors on the custodial staff. Three of the students participated in a semester-long job shadow program at TE Connectivity where they learned the different jobs, the materials made and the skills needed in the manufacturing sector. At the conclusion of the semester, CCPS held a luncheon celebrating the partnership with our local businesses and recognizing the skills, and knowledge the students gained.

The first program was very successful and the students enjoyed the experience. Peyton Davis, who graduated from CCHS in 2022, and was one of the first Start on Success students shared, "The Start on Success Program taught me how


to be more patient with people." His classmate Oswaldo Leon-Bustillo said, "Being part of this program helped me learn that being consistent is important, and that more experience will give me more confidence and knowledge."

This school year, five new students began their participation in the Culpeper Start on Success School to Work program. In the fall, students completed the Education for Employment class. During the fall class, students learn about soft skills, job applications, interviewing and participating in a mock interview.

This spring, the students have started internship placements working with the Culpeper Parks and Recreation Department at the new Fieldhouse. They work with mentors and current employees learning how to set the gym up for the various activities, learning how to maintain the fields, working with staff on programs and classes they would like to see offered, and assisting with running the class. The students are also learning about running the front desk and interacting with members of the community that come in to use the facility. Bledsoe said, "They are taking the initiative to seek out what they need to do and what their supervisor expects from them. They grow in their confidence in being successful on the job and in their future."

In reflecting on the program so far, the students feel that the program is making a difference for them. Kain Hogsed said, "The Start on Success Program helped me gain responsibility in getting my work done and building my accountability." Adam Weakley added that the program "has given me real world experience in getting ready for my first real job." Gabi Membreno said that the program, "helps give you an open mind and plenty of opportunities" and Khloe Bowles added, "This class and program has helped me become a little more confident and sure of my skills on the job." James Stephens said, "I have gained more knowledge on how to do taxes and work in a job setting properly."

Holly Binkert, Fieldhouse - Athletics Manager at Culpeper Parks and Rec said, "The students of the SOS program have come to work hard and learn! It is apparent that the program has already made a positive impact on these young men and women. Culpeper Parks & Recreation and Culpeper County Public Schools has created a partnership that fosters growth and opportunity! Coming from teaching special education for the last several years, it has always been a mission of mine to create programs for citizens with all needs and abilities. Not only have we partnered with CCPS for the SOS program, but we are also creating an entire unified program for people of all abilities and needs with the help of our SOS employees. We hope to continue this wonderful partnership for years to come!" Culpeper Quarterly

# Virginia's Constitutions: An Exhibition from the Library of Virginia

#### Now through April 8

We invite you to learn more about all six of Virginia's Constitutions in a poster exhibition.

State constitutions are one of the most essential parts of the social contract. They articulate a way of life and embody fundamentally important ideas about the relationships between people and their government. State constitutions provide additional protections and rights not named in the federal constitution, and can be amended more often than the federal one. Thomas Jefferson believed that state constitutions should be revised at regular intervals.





#### A Wild and Crazy...Artist???

Steve Martin has been recognized for decades as a great writer, actor, and comedian. In his stand-up comedy act, Martin, in a pure white suit to match his premature gray hair, would don a gag arrow-through-his-head prop and play ditties on the banjo, while doing funny bits of often outlandish comedy. The image of a man in a white suit and gray hair, with an arrow through his head, doing absurdist comedy while plucking and picking away on a banjo, was enough to keep audiences in the 1970's and 80's in stitches.

Over time, Martin appeared less on the stand-up stage and more on the movie screen, his comedy more refined and family friendly. The fake arrow-through-the-head disappeared with the white suits, the banjo went back in its case and got pushed to the back of the closet.

Or so many of us thought...

In fact, Steve Martin never really stopped playing the banjo and in the early years of the 21st century, Martin transitioned from being strictly a comedian and actor, adding accomplished musician to his list of accolades. In 2001, Martin played banjo on the Earl Scruggs remake of "Foggy Mountain Breakdown", which won the Best Country Instrumental Performance Grammy in 2002. In 2009, he would release an album entitled "The Crow: New Songs for the 5-String Banjo. The album, which featured vocals by Vince Gill and Dolly Parton, won a Grammy for Best Bluegrass Album in 2010. In May 2009, Steve Martin made his first appearance on the stage of the Grand Ole Opry. In June, he began a long partnership with Steep Canyon Rangers by appearing on the radio show A Prairie Home Companion. Martin has gone on to perform all over the world with his banjo, creating new respect for the instrument and showcasing musicians who have mastered it. To honor banjo and bluegrass virtuosity, Martin established the Steve Martin Prize for Excellence in Banjo and Bluegrass in 2010.

Martin's artistic interests do not end with the banjo. Steve Martin also supports the visual arts, as an avid collector of art and former board member of the Los Angeles County Museum of Art. He has organized art shows, and even loaned some of his personal art collection for exhibits. He is also a talented writer, author of several best-selling books, screenplays, and plays.

Artists may become famous in one form of art, like the theatrical art known as stand-up comedy, but their appreciation of other forms of art and desire to introduce it to new audiences is what allows different forms of art, and different genres of art disciplines, to thrive and receive recognition for its contributions to our society.
