

A Message from the Board of Supervisors



Dear Citizens,

Greetings from your Board of Supervisors. As Chairman for the Board of Supervisors for 2024, I have the honor of writing this cover letter for our Culpeper Quarterly newsletter. Before I go further, I do wish to recognize West Fairfax District Supervisor Gary Deal, who served as Chairman of the Board for the last four years. His leadership has been appreciated by all of his fellow Board members.

There are currently many issues facing the Board, with perhaps the most pressing issue being the development of the Fiscal Year 2025 Budget. By the time this issue is delivered, we will be getting closer to understanding the outlook for the Budget. This is a process that takes much of our time and attention, and that of our staff, each and every winter. As part of that process, every two years Culpeper County performs a reassessment of land values. The Department of Real Estate Assessments is responsible for the fair and equitable valuation of real property in Culpeper County. FY25 however, is not a reassessment year. This Budget, as always, will bring challenges, chief among them being the needs for public safety. Along with education, public safety is always a high priority. Road improvements are also a key need. The Board will strive to continue to keep taxes low while working to provide the best services and quality of life improvements for our citizens.

In addition to Budget development, the Board has a steady stream of land use applications to consider, and general County Business. There are discussions ongoing regarding the development of plans for a new elementary school, which is needed to relieve the pressure of crowding in our current schools. Architectural plans for the renovation of Culpeper Middle School are also being drawn up at this time.

As a local government, we seek to always act in the best interest of our community and its citizens. Every member of the Board is committed to doing what is best for the community as a whole. It is our greatest wish that 2024 will bring good health and prosperity to each and every one of our citizens.





Transforming Homes for Heroes: A Marine Corps Veteran's Journey to Accessibility

For lots of folks, home is more than just a place; it's like a cozy and safe haven. But in a world where making things accessible isn't always top of mind, homes might not keep up with people's changing needs, especially for our valued veterans. That's where the disAbility Resource Center (dRC) steps up to make a real difference.

Meet Michael, a Marine Corps veteran facing the challenges of 100% disability, including PTSD and physical balance issues. Michael's bathroom, once a source of difficulty, has now become a symbol of triumph, thanks to the dRC's home modification grant programs. Michael received a grant through the Granting Freedom Program that facilitated the installation of a walk-in shower, not only improving his safety and reducing the risk of falls but also playing a crucial role in easing the anxiety associated with those challenges.

For veterans like Michael, a partnership between Virginia Housing and the Virginia Department of Veteran Services makes the Granting Freedom program possible. This initiative offers grants of up to \$8,000 per residence or rental unit, specifically for Virginia veterans and service members who sustained a line-of-duty injury resulting in a service-connected disability.

Transforming Lives, One Home at a Time

We're proud that we've been able to help so many veterans in the communities we serve, and glad to have home modification grant programs available to veterans and civilians alike. One of these is the Rental Unit Accessibility Modification (RUAM) Program, a program crafted to enhance accessibility in rental units for low-income tenants in need. We also administer an Owner-Occupied Modification Program that empowers low-income homeowners to tackle obstacles that limit the accessibility of their homes and make their space more functional.

Home modification grants serve as a lifeline for individuals striving to make their homes safer and more accessible. They guarantee that heroes like Michael can relish the comfort and security of their own space, irrespective of age or physical condition. MARCH IS COLORECTAL CANCER AWARENESS MONTH schedule your colonoscopy!

March is Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month. Colorectal cancer is a disease in which cells in the colon or rectum grow out of control. Sometimes

it is called colon cancer, for short. The colon is the large intestine or large bowel. The rectum is the passageway that connects the colon to the anus.

Sometimes abnormal growths, called polyps, form in the colon or rectum. Over time, some polyps may turn into cancer. Screening tests can find polyps so they can be removed before turning into cancer. Screening also helps find colorectal cancer at an early stage when treatment works best. Your risk of getting colorectal cancer increases as you get older. Other risk factors include having:

- Inflammatory bowel disease such as Crohn's disease or ulcerative colitis
- A personal or family history of colorectal cancer or colorectal polyps

There are also lifestyle factors that may increase your risk of developing colon cancer:

- Lack of regular physical activity.
- A diet low in fruit and vegetables
- A low-fiber and high-fat diet, or a diet high in processed meats
- Being overweight or obese
- Alcohol consumption
- Tobacco use

The most effective way to reduce your risk of colorectal cancer is to get screened for it routinely, beginning at age 45. If you have colorectal cancer and have symptoms, they may include:

- A change in bowel habits
- Blood in or on your stool (bowel movement)
- Diarrhea, constipation, or feeling that the bowel does not empty all the way
- Abdominal pain, aches, or cramps that don't go away
- Unexplained weight loss

If you have any of these symptoms, talk to your doctor. They may be caused by something other than cancer. For more information, visit: https://www.cdc.gov/cancer/colorectal.

The Museum of Culpeper History is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization that collects, preserves, interprets, and promotes the history of Culpeper by engaging and educating diverse audiences with our collections to create an increased understanding of the significant historical events that formed the community we know today. The museum's goal is to tell the stories of all Culpeper residents by highlighting our community's shared past through our exhibits and programs. Our core values of education, stewardship, community, integrity, and preservation guide our efforts.

Located in downtown Culpeper's historic train depot adjacent to the Culpeper Visitor Center, the museum is open seven days a week from 10AM-4PM. Admission is free for all Culpeper County residents and all children under the age of 18.

TOURS & PROGRAMS

Guided Tours

Guided tours for adult or school groups may be scheduled by calling the Museum's Education Coordinator at (540) 829-1749. Tours can be customized to suit your group's interests and time constraints. Home school groups, after-school groups, scout groups and clubs are all invited to experience the Museum through a specialized tour. A minimum of two weeks advance notice is required. A program fee is charged for guided tours.

Walking Tours

The museum leads a number of tours of historic areas in the town and county of Culpeper. Group walking tours are available on request subject to the museum's schedule and the availability of its staff and volunteers. Minimum group size is 7 people; maximum group size is 14. Two weeks advance notice is required and a program fee is charged.

Little Learners

Little Learners is the museum's interactive series of children's programming that brings fun facts, objects, and activities out of the past to your family today! The series, targeted at ages 2-5, will be held monthly. Each month will feature a different craft inspired by local history. Past programs have included flying kites, drawing maps, and making your own dinosaur tracks! Programs are offered the last Wednesday of the month at 10:30 and 11:30 AM. Admission to this program is FREE. Advance reservations required

Working with youth is never a dull moment. When youth are referred to our agency for community service, we want them to understand the work they will be doing is more than just a requirement they must fulfill, but the opportunity for them to learn new skills as well as find new areas of interest. During the intake process we find out a lot about the clients we work with. Many of our clients report they spend a great deal of time on social media, spending time with their friends, playing video games, and sports. Some have reported having part time jobs and working outdoors or have an interest in automotives. The Back to Nature project gives our youth the chance to break out of their comfort zone. The program gives the youth opportunities to give back as well as

being outside in nature. The program also gives staff the opportunities to give back do were do being outside in nature. The program also gives staff the opportunity to reminisce of their childhood. Growing up my grandparents had a garden and every summer my cousins and I would assist with picking vegetables. As much as I would have liked to be in the house reading or watching a movie, the memories spent with my grandparents are something I will treasure. The memories and this project also gave me the opportunity to become a Master Gardener Volunteer. Our clients recently completed a community service project in which they worked with the Master Gardeners at the Carver Center Garden cleaning debris. These clients worked on this project. With all the projects we assigned the clients to, we want our youth to know and understand the work they are doing is more than just giving back, but we are teaching them skills and positive memories.





OPTIONS is a county program for youth ages 11-17. OPTIONS staff evaluate and determine a youth's risk of getting into further trouble with the legal system, in school, at home, in the community or with the use of illicit substances. OPTIONS then implements evidence-based programs to assist youth in developing personal skills to become productive, respectful, and responsible members of the community.

Reva Volunteer Fire and Rescue by Joshua Hall and Matthew Duckwitz

Founded in 1995, the Reva Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department has grown from being a small "station" run from a member's garage, to a large independent structure consisting of approximately 40 active members. The department maintains and operates a fleet 8 apparatus and one MCI trailer. In 2023 alone, Reva VFR ran over 300 emergency medical calls and over 100 fire related calls in support of the local community, the county of Culpeper, and the state of Virginia.

Reva VF&R is a community focused and driven department. We provide community education and outreach through local programs and schools. We provide hall rentals that assist with a variety of needs such as home-business growth and even children's birthday parties. We also host the Blue Ridge Area Food Bank's Mobile Pantry monthly on the fourth Wednesday. Since we no longer have Bingo as our main fundraiser, we have taken to new opportunities, we have recently started to host craft shows to show off our local vendors. This summer we will be hosting our first car show in conjunction with a craft fair. We are always looking for new ways to raise money and awareness and be more in touch with the community. Reva recently assisted Madison County and Virgina Department of Forestry with the Quaker Run Forest fire. We had multiple units and members there for extended periods of time to help supplement and fight the almost 4,000-acre fire.

In December 2023, the department voted in a new Fire Chief, Matthew McClurg, while sending our best wishes to the outgoing Chief, Billy Hamm, on his new endeavors. Chief McClurg has been volunteering with the department since he was 17. This year will mark his 18th year with the department. In addition, Chief McClurg is a Lieutenant with Prince William County Fire and Rescue and has worked there for 16 years.

This past year we also welcomed 5 new released EMT's. This has greatly increased our response capabilities. We have two members who have just completed the EMT course with three more getting ready to start EMT class in the coming weeks.

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Culpeper County Schools by Laura M. Hoover, CCPS Director of Communication and the CTEC School News Team New Firefighter Program Ignites Opportunities for CTEC Students

In an exciting development at the Culpeper Technical Education Center (CTEC), a new Firefighter Program is set to blaze a trail for rising 11th and 12thgrade students next year. The program, designed to be paired with the existing Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) program, aims to equip students with the essential certifications required for a successful career in firefighting.

Culpeper County Public Schools (CCPS) Director of Career and Technical Education Randi Richards-Lutz said that the school division has considered adding this program for years, but explained that this is the perfect time to roll out this new program because, "at CTEC, we can pair the firefighter program with the EMT program. The employment field needs both, and students will now have the opportunity to graduate with both credentials," she explained.

Students at CTEC now have the flexibility to enroll in either program independently or opt for a comprehensive education by undertaking both, one during their junior year and the second program during their senior year. The initiative is expected to provide a holistic learning experience that goes beyond traditional classroom instruction.

Eastern View High School (EVHS) junior Dylan Seay is currently enrolled in the EMT program at CTEC and plans to take the Firefighter course next year. He said, "I'm really excited for this program because I want to help people." He continued, "My dad was a firefighter, I want to follow in his footsteps and many other schools do not offer this program." Dylan said that he is looking forward to the hands-on components of the program because he has heard from many people that, "you can't really experience firefighting without doing it."



Key features of the new CTEC Firefighter Program include:

- Discipline and Real-World Preparedness:
 - Develops discipline and instills a commitment to standards crucial for real-world firefighting scenarios.
 - Covers HAZMAT procedures and search-and-rescue techniques, preparing students for diverse challenges in the field.
- Hands-On Learning:
 - Offers hands-on experience with firefighting equipment, procedures, and cutting-edge technologies used by fire departments.
 - Provides a practical understanding of the tools and techniques that are essential for effective firefighting.
- Challenging Curriculum:
 - Pushes students academically, mentally, and physically, ensuring they are well-prepared for the demands of a career in firefighting.
 - Challenges students to exceed their limits, fostering a mindset of continuous improvement.
- NFPA Standards Compliance:
 - Adheres to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) 1001-2019 requirements, ensuring that students receive training that meets industry standards.
 - Guarantees that graduates are well-versed in the latest protocols and practices endorsed by the NFPA.
- Certification Opportunity:
 - Prepares students for Firefighter I & II certifications, opening doors to various career opportunities within the firefighting sector.
 - Ensures that graduates are not only knowledgeable but also formally recognized for their expertise in firefighting.

CTEC Principal Shaun Summerscales and Richards-Lutz explained that this program will only be possible because of the great community support the school has received from the local community. Richards-Lutz said, "This program is community supported, our firefighters will now be able to complete their training right here in Culpeper." Summerscales added, "Our students will be required to volunteer with the local volunteer fire departments and the local departments will also assist us with access to materials." They also said that any student who completes the certification will be qualified to volunteer with any of our local volunteer fire departments.

The introduction of the Firefighter Program at CTEC is a testament to the institution's commitment to providing students with practical and relevant skills. By offering this comprehensive program, CTEC aims to mold the next generation of competent and resilient firefighters, ready to serve their community with dedication and expertise.
