### A Message from the Board of Supervisors

#### Dear Citizens:

We hope that this issue of The Culpeper Minutes finds you well, and that you are enjoying the onset of summer. Jumping right into County business, I will first address the fiscal year 2025 Budget which was adopted on May 7th. The budget commences July 1, 2024, and runs through June 30, 2025. The budget increased this year, to \$300,643,656. The budget includes some important capital improvement projects and fully funds the Culpeper County Public Schools' request. The total budget number is somewhat inflated by the fact that it includes \$69 million for renovation of Culpeper Middle School. The project will be debt funded, so while the total amount is shown in the budget, it will actually be paid back over a twenty-year period. This was not a reassessment year. The budget includes an increase of one cent in the Real Estate Tax, going from 0.46 to 0.47. This is the lowest tax rate in the region by far. Personal Property Tax rates are all remaining flat. The projected fund balance will be approximately 13% of the total operational budget, which is well within County financial policy. I am happy to say that the County is in fine financial condition.

In addition to the good news on budget and tax rates, the Board is proud of several projects which are coming to fruition. The public swimming pool project being largely funded by the Town of Culpeper has been designed and at least at the time of this writing, a contract award is expected soon. Improvements to The Carver Center are also continuing. In fact, the County was recently awarded \$500,000 in federal funds for improvements to the Auditorium there, and an additional \$132,777 in federal funds for improvements to the trails at Lenn Park. The Public Works Committee of the Board is working diligently on plans for future road improvements, working through VDOT to fund projects through both the Revenue Sharing Program and the Smart Scale Program.

There will be many community events this summer, and there have been many already during the spring. If you are one who enjoys visiting breweries, distilleries, and wineries, visit the County web site to learn about a new opportunity-- The Sips of Culpeper Beverage Trail. The Economic Development Department has recently launched this program in which you can reap rewards from visiting multiple establishments in our community and collecting a stamp on your passport at each one you visit. In general, keep an eye out for the activities and events that are going on and enjoy some recreational opportunities—our community is thriving! We hope that everyone has an excellent summer. On behalf of the Board, I invite you to let us know anytime that you have concerns, comments, or suggestions. The Board and the County staff are here to assist you.

### **Culpeper County Volunteer Firefighters spend day training in Farmhouse**

On the Saturday before Easter, Culpeper County Fire/EMS volunteers gathered to train on an acquired structure (old Farmhouse) that was being demolished. Prior to Saturday, several worked to "ready" the house to ensure the house was safe, the burn rooms were partitioned off to keep the fire attack crews contained to the fire rooms to ensure accountability and safety of all the igniters, firefighters in the IDLH (Immediate Danger to Life or Health) atmosphere. A Training Plan was developed and strictly followed throughout the day. Additionally, the Virginia Department of Fire Programs Live Burn and ICS Forms packet was also included ensuring all areas were covered; Pre Burn checks, Medical forms for all firefighters participating in IDLH conditions that included baseline vitals and vitals after each of the interior firefighting exercise, Personal Protective Gear inspections, Incident Briefing, critical ICS positions filled, Incident Commander, Safety Officer, PIO, Operations Section and 1403 Compliance officer roles were all filled with highly trained members.

This was an eight-hour day of hands-on training for approximately 40 firefighters who were able to pull hose lines from the rigs, attack lines, backup lines, a backup line from an alternate water source, pulling ceilings and walls to check for extension, staffing the Rapid Intervention Team role and resources enabling this RIT crew to enter and remove a down firefighter if needed. The Command Board was utilized during the entire event tracking firefighter accountability and roles assigned. Medics were on the scene performing vitals. Given

deployed with 4,000 gallons of water feeding the Engines and Tanker Shuttles were exercised by going to a nearby hydrant, topping off the tankers and having them staged if the water was needed. At the end of the day, a Decontamination area was set up for all firefighters who were in the IDLH atmosphere and were required to participate in a gross decontamination to remove cancerous causing toxins on their PPE that may have been picked up in the training.

Just to conclude, we also had a couple of guest firefighters who were in Madison County delivering training. These firefighters/officers are on the national

teaching circuit and were excited to participate in this event. One of the instructors works in Loudoun County, the other a career firefighter from the Mid-West and is a Fire Chief in Ohio. When welcoming them to Culpeper for the burn, they communicated to me they had heard many positive comments about our volunteer training program in Culpeper. At the end of the day they were impressed by the collaboration of all the departments working as one team throughout all the different scenarios during the day.

My thanks to Assistant Chief Joe Weeks from Culpeper County Volunteer

Fire Department who spent many hours just organizing and planning this successful exercise and who served as Incident Commander throughout the day. My thanks to all the firefighters, Instructors and Support staff who fully embraced the opportunity to make it a true training day for everyone on the fire training ground. Finally, I too want to thank the Stover family for donating the structure/farmhouse to us for training. Additionally, our sincere thanks for refreshments throughout servina the day. This was well above our expectations and highly appreciated by all those who put in a hard day's work.


























### **Brandy Station Volunteer Fire Department**

The Brandy Station Volunteer Fire Department is celebrating its 72<sup>nd</sup> year of service to our community this year. Volunteer personnel currently respond to the building to answer emergency calls, from a home response program when dispatched by the Culpeper County Emergency Dispatch Center. The department's average response time for 2023 was five minutes and 30 seconds. During the 2023 calendar year, the department logged 840 total calls and 13,787 hours. The department is an all-volunteer fire department consisting of 65 members. Volunteers of the department have a strong desire to help people in our community in the event of an emergency. We continue a long-standing tradition of neighbors helping neighbors. The department carries a community Insurance Services Office (ISO) classification of Class 05/5Y. This translates to lower property insurance rates for county residents. The department provides the only ice rescue team that is equipped and trained in the immediate area.

During 2023, the department completed its Community Fire Prevention Safety Outreach Program with local churches and public elementary schools with approximately 400 kids in attendance. Additionally, the department annually participates with the school administration in performing a mock DUI car accident demonstration that educates approximately 800 high school students on the importance of creating a safe prom event and showing possible outcomes of drinking and driving.

Annually, the department sponsors the Junior Rookie Camp held in June, two drivers for the Culpeper Soap Box Derby, participates with the Culpeper Red & Blue Project and facilitates the Culpeper Community Christmas Gift Basket Program.

Revenue is generated through fundraising events, which include the annual firemen's fair, lawn & garden tractor pull, car show, banquet hall rentals, and community donations. The following open to the public events for 2024:

- Junior Rookie Camp June 17 thru 21
- August 7 thru 11 Firemen's Fair
- August 8 Firemen's Parade
- August 10 Lawn & Garden Tractor Pull
- October 26 Car & Tractor Show

We look forward to seeing our community at these events and thank you for your continued support.

This summer, PATH Recreation & Fitness Center will host its second season of camps for youth. Programming serves all ages, from tots ages 2-4 looking for recreation, crafts & games to high schoolers intent on fine tuning volleyball or basketball skills.

"Since opening in 2022, we've offered recreation, fitness and sports programs that respond to youth interests," said PRFC director Christine Kauffmann. "We look forward to seeing familiar faces among our campers and welcoming new participants. Anyone interested in our camps is encouraged to inquire. As part of the Culpeper Wellness Foundation, our mission is to serve the health and wellness needs of the community."

PRFC's summer camp line-up:

Clubhouse on the Courts for ages 2-4 (June 3-7) and ages 5-7 (July 8-12). This camp focuses on games, obstacle courses, imaginative play and crafts to encourage movement, curiosity and creativity.

Youth Baseball Camp with the Culpeper Cavaliers, Culpeper's Valley Baseball League franchise (June 10-14). Baseball players ages 9-13 (all positions) will work on game skills with instruction from the Cavaliers' high-level college ballplayers. The recreation center's multisport courts and batting cages will be home base for drills and instruction.

Athlete Sculpting Camp for youth athletes in 4th-12th grade (June 17-21). With guidance from PRFC personal trainer and functional strength coach Marcus Haywood, campers will build and improve on their strength, balance, speed and agility to complement their game play.

Basketball Camp for middle school youth (June 24-28). Basketball players will work with middle school coach Bobby Zajkowski for skill development and game play.

Pickleball camp for ages 8-12 (July 8-12). Kat Blanco, a certified pickleball instructor, will guide campers through fun drills, swing practice, and game rules to learn how to play this popular game.

Volleyball camps with Culpeper County High School varsity coach Olivia Masaitis. Coach Masaitis will lead camps for 3<sup>rd</sup> – 5<sup>th</sup> graders (July 15-19), middle



schoolers (July 15-19) and high school-age girls (July 22-26). An experienced player, coach & official, coach Masaitis will focus on building skills, knowledge of the game and strategy to help players get to the next level.

Advanced Skills Basketball Camp (July 29 – August 2). This camp with Culpeper County High School varsity coach James Thompson is for 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> grade boys interested in honing their game skills.

## 2nd Annual Event Exposes Culpeper County Library to Fun

Beginning with Keynote Speaker author, graphic novelist, and artist, Zach Weinersmith, charged with a positive message which follows well with Uncanny Sponsor, Encompass Community Supports.

At 10am the doors opened to a full schedule of sessions throughout the day until 5pm.

Many of the events in the large were live-streamed via YouTube by Culpeper Media Network's Nicolle Wooten. These included the Geek Wellness Panel with moderator-staff member Esther Edwards, a presentation by Director Shane Fellux, Culpeper LARP Demonstration (sponsored by an anonymous donor), and the closing ceremony with special guests from the Piedmont Community Band of Windmore Foundation for the Arts.

From the dinosaurs who walked the earth, to Culpeper's role in our country's founding and the ongoing struggle for equal rights, to the challenges of an ever-changing modern world, Culpeper has a story to tell. Find your story at the Museum of Culpeper History!

The Museum of Culpeper History is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization that collects, preserves, interprets, and promotes the history of Culpeper by engaging and educating diverse audiences with our collections to create an increased understanding of the significant historical events that formed the community we know today. The museum's goal is to tell the stories of all Culpeper residents by highlighting our community's shared past through our exhibits and programs. Our core values of education, stewardship, community, integrity, and preservation guide our efforts.

Located in downtown Culpeper's historic train depot adjacent to the Culpeper Visitor Center, the museum is open seven days a week from 10AM-4PM. Admission is free for all Culpeper County residents and all children under the age of 18.

#### **TOURS & PROGRAMS**

#### **Guided Tours**

Guided tours for adult or school groups may be scheduled by calling the Museum's Education Coordinator at (540) 829-1749. Tours can be customized to suit your group's interests and time constraints. Home school groups, after-school groups, scout groups and clubs are all invited to experience the Museum through a specialized tour. A minimum of two weeks advance notice is required. A program fee is charged for guided tours.

#### Walking Tours

The museum leads a number of tours of historic areas in the town and county of Culpeper. Group walking tours are available on request subject to the museum's schedule and the availability of its staff and volunteers. Minimum group size is 7 people; maximum group size is 14. Two weeks advance notice is required, and a program fee is charged.

The series, targeted at ages 2-5, will be held monthly. Each month will feature a different craft inspired by local history. #### THE BRANDY STATION FOUNDATION

The Brandy Station Foundation is a non-profit 501 (c) (3) all-volunteer community organization dedicated to preserving the natural and historic resources of the Brandy Station area of Culpeper County. #### **GRAFFITI HOUSE TOURS**

The Brandy Station Foundation operates the Graffiti House at 19484 Brandy Road in Brandy Station which contains Civil War graffiti and a



museum. The Graffiti House is a two-story frame structure built in 1858. Soldiers at the Graffiti House wrote their names and messages on the walls using charcoal from the fireplaces. The walls of the house contain inscriptions, drawings, messages, and signatures of both Federal and Confederate soldiers, hence the name "Graffiti House." The Graffiti House is open from 11AM to 4PM on the 1st, 3rd, and 5th
