Happy New Year! We hope that everyone has enjoyed a safe and happy holiday season. As we look back over the past year, there were a number of notable successes that we are proud of. We approved our current operational budget at one of the lowest tax rates in the Commonwealth while continuing to offer our residents a high level of civic investment. This was made possible with some strategic economic gains such as the AWS data center currently under construction along Route 3. Maintaining the balance between growth and development and our rural way of life is something we take very seriously. Supporting our agricultural industries and celebrating their success was at the heart of our decision to expand the annual Culpeper Farm Tour and increase awareness through the Culpeper County Economic Development Initiative "Choose Culpeper Farms." The long-anticipated Community Kitchen opened at the Carver Center in late September. Local businesses and food producers are benefitting greatly from this amenity. A number of educational offerings have already been hosted at The Carver Center and will continue to be offered to those interested in starting or expanding a food-based business. In November, Culpeper County received a KABOOM! grant which built a brand-new playground at Spilman Park. The local community and a number of businesses volunteered to help construct the playground over the course of three days and the result is a new, vibrant play space we hope you will visit and enjoy. The Culpeper Fieldhouse celebrated one year in operation in early December. Tens of thousands of residents have made use of this facility. We know the addition of a public pool will add even more appeal communitywide. We hope you would agree that Culpeper County has much to be proud of.

November of 2023 brought with it a number of local elections. We wish to give a warm welcome and congratulations to our newest Board member, David Lee, who will be representing the East Fairfax District. Congratulations also go to Supervisor Deal, Supervisor Bates and Supervisor Underwood who all successfully ran unopposed for another term. We also wish to welcome two new constitutional officers. Sheriff Tim Chilton and Commonwealth's Attorney Russ Rabb.

The upcoming year promises to continue to be a busy one, as Culpeper County seeks to address a wide array of issues, beginning with the development of the fiscal year 2025 Budget. We are always happy to hear from you on any subject. Please feel free to contact any Board member or member of the staff regarding concerns or ideas you may have. #### The Culpeper County Volunteer Fire Department "Celebrating 100 years of Volunteer Service"

On January 10<sup>th</sup>, we will be celebrating our Centennial Anniversary, proudly serving the citizens of the Town and County of Culpeper with 100% VOLUNTEER fire protection for 100 years. We were chartered and reorganized in 1924.

The first meeting was held on Thursday, January 10<sup>th</sup>, the officers were appointed, and a roster was drawn up. On that night the roster contained the names of 19 men. Our first Chief was J. William Swan who served 22 years. We were incorporated on April 25, 1929. Our first truck was a 1923 American LaFrance Brockway "Torpedo". In 1924, our firehouse was on the first floor of the Municipal building located on West Davis St. In 1960, the old Methodist Church sanctuary on West Davis St. was razed, and our current firehouse was built and still stands today as our firehouse.

The CCVFD provides fire protection to over 21,184 residents in the town and 33,126 residents in the county, covering 383 square miles. We provide trained VOLUNTEERS to staff two engines, a ladder/tower, a rescue engine, and a brush truck, and we answer over 900 fire related calls for service annually. Our members are ordinary citizens from all walks of life, careers, financial and religious backgrounds, each with jobs and family responsibilities, who respond to community emergencies.

The Culpeper County Volunteer Fire Department mission is to provide the highest quality emergency services to citizens of our entire community. This is achieved through our principles of commitment, education, recognized standards, and professionalism. Our priority will always be the preservation of life and property.



#### Rappahannock Rapidan Health District by Mary E. Chamberlin, Community Engagement Specialist

January is Cervical Health Awareness Month and it's a good time for us to share information about how women can protect themselves from HPV (human papillomavirus) and cervical cancer. HPV is a very common virus that spreads through

intimate skin to skin contact and sexual contact. It is a major cause of cervical cancer and can also lead to cancers of other body parts, as well as genital warts. Fortunately, there is a safe and effective vaccine that can prevent 90% of these cancers. Learn more from CDC: https://www.cdc.gov/cancer/dcpc/resources/features/cervicalcancer/index.htm

HPV vaccine is recommended for both males and females aged 9-27 years. If you are 27-45, talk to your doctor to see if this shot is right for you. The vaccine protects against cancer best when it's given before a person is exposed to the virus, but it can still help prevent cancer after intimate contact or sexual activity.

The Rappahannock-Rapidan Health District offers the HPV vaccine at our local health department clinics by appointment. For clinic schedules, visit: https://www.vdh.virginia.gov/rappahannock-rapidan/immunizations.

The HPV test and the Pap test are screening tests that can help prevent cervical cancer or find it early. Pap tests at should begin at age 21. There are also testing options for those age 30 to 65 years old. Talk to your doctor about which testing option is right for you.

Every Woman's Life (EWL) is a public health program that helps uninsured, low-income women gain access to free breast and cervical cancer screening services. Screening and early detection reduces death rates, improves treatment options, and greatly increases survival. #### American chestnut hybrid (Castanea dentata x mollisima x crenata)

Full Sun to Partial Sun; seedlings from open-pollinated nuts collected from select (blight tolerant with American chestnut form and appearance) trees in the Lesesne State Forest chestnut breeding area. Exact pedigree cannot be guaranteed because they are open-pollinated (male parent unknown), but these likely contain more than 50% American chestnut DNA with the remainder a mix of Chinese and/or Japanese chestnut origin. Should have improved blight resistance and are more likely to survive than wild-type American chestnut, but still are likely to become infected and may not survive to maturity.





#### Eastern redbud (Cercis canadensis)

Full sun to shade tolerant; Eastern redbud reaches a mature size of 15 to 30 feet in height and 6 to 10 inches in diameter. It grows on moist, well-drained woodlands. The wood is heavy, hard, not strong and rich, dark brown in color. Some birds and mammals eat the seeds. Redbud is planted as an ornamental tree suitable for small landscapes.





#### American elderberry (Sambucus canadensis)

Full sun to shade tolerant; this is a small understory species that grows well in riparian woodlands, but can also grow as individuals in a woodland setting. They grow well on moist, well-drained sites. Elderberry can grow to be 6-14 feet tall and wide. Pollination occurs in the early summer by bees and native pollinators. Flowers will be big, beautiful white clusters in the early summer. In late summer to early fall, the plant with be covered with clusters of black berries that are 4 to 6 mm wide. The fruit is eaten by bear, game birds, small mammals and song birds. The stems and foliage are desired by deer.





#### Red-osier Dogwood (Cornus sericea)

Full sun to shade tolerant; Red-osier dogwood is a large, 7- to 9-foot erect shrub best suited where the background, such as evergreens, will show off the dark red winter stems. Besides attractive, red stems in the winter, red-osier dogwood has yellowish-white flowers that appear in late May to early June, and bluish-white fruit borne in late summer. Fall color is reddish-purple.





#### Silver maple (Acer saccharinum)

Full sun to shade tolerant; Silver Maple is a tall, fast-growing multibranched tree that can reach heights of 50 to 80 feet. It is often planted in hedge rows, wetlands and riparian areas. It flowers in the spring in small, dense reddish clusters. The seed are samaras (winged) and mature in the early summer. The samaras are the biggest of any native maple in Virginia. Wildlife use varies from squirrels eating buds in the early spring; deer eating the bark in the winter, and the trunk tends to make cavities that provide shelter for tree-dwelling mammals, owls and woodpeckers.





#### Shortleaf pine (Pinus echinata)

Full sun; Shortleaf pine reaches a mature size of 80 to 100 feet in height and 2 to 3 feet in diameter. It is used largely for interior and exterior finishing, flooring, general construction, veneers, paper pulp and poles. Shortleaf pine produces high-quality lumber. It grows best on deep, well-drained soils, but tolerates nutrient-deficient sites.





#### Chestnut oak (Quercus prinus)

Full sun; Chestnut oak reaches a mature size of 50 to 70 feet in height and 2 to 3 feet in diameter. The chestnut oak attains best growth in well-drained coves and stream sides, but is commonly found on dry, rocky slopes and ridges. The wood is similar to, and often marketed as, white oak, and is used for lumber, beams, railroad ties, flooring, furniture and planking. The large acorns are sweet and are eaten by a variety of wildlife.

#### RETURNING: POLLINATOR MEADOW SEED MIX FOR SMALL AREAS OF YOUR YARD!

This meadow seed mix includes an already pre-mixed cover crop and will cover a 1,000 square foot area.

The meadow mix does best in sunny areas that receive 6 hours or more of sunlight.

The mix is designed for both riparian and upland sites. Detailed instructions will accompany the seed mix at pick up.

#### RETURNING THIS YEAR: Live stakes to address streambank erosion and other uses

Silky dogwood (*Cornaceae cornus amomum*) and Buttonbush (*Cephalanthus occidentalis*). These shrub cuttings come in bundles and root readily when planted in moist soils.



Whether you have an eroding stream bank or want to restore a riparian area, consider planting with live stakes. Live staking is the practice of using unrooted cuttings to propagate shrubs and some trees for establishing vegetation in difficult riparian areas such as stream banks and floodplains. Using cuttings from dormant multi-stem shrubs and trees which have the capacity to grow roots once they are tapped or hammered into the ground.

#### The Impact of Winter Weather in CCPS

Culpeper County Public Schools is always prepared for the possibility of inclement weather. The winter season is typically when weather closings are most common, although we have had to close in other seasons as well. In the 2022-2023 school year, we did not have any full day closures compared to missing an entire week the year before. Last year, we were able to get through the winter with two-hour delays.

We are often asked how the school division makes weather closing decisions. The answer is that the decision-making process with regards to closing schools for inclement weather is complex. The safety of our students and staff is our top priority. Here are the answers to some frequently asked questions about weather closings and delays in CCPS:

#### How does CCPS make weather closing decisions?

- Monitor weather conditions and forecasts
- Review road condition information from the local 911 dispatch and on-the-road Sheriff's Deputies
- Check certain areas of the county known to be more prone to icing or slow melting
- Senior Staff and Division Superintendent review the information gathered and make a delay/closing decision

## How does CCPS notify families and the community when school is closed or delayed?

- CCPS announces closing/delay decisions in a variety of ways:
- Phone call, email, and text message to all families in English and Spanish
- CCPS Social Media Facebook, Twitter, Instagram
- CCPS Website www.culpeperschools.org
- Push notification to the CCPS Mobile App
- Local media outlets
  - o TV channels 4,5,7,9 & 29
  - o Radio WJMA 103.1

#### What are the possible closing/delay options?

- School Closure
  - Calls/Emails will be made to families and staff and will include reporting time for 12-month employees and essential personnel
- 2-hour Delay
  - Allows time for staff to clear snow or ice at the schools, and gives bus drivers the advantage of daylight to see hazardous conditions
- Early Dismissal
  - o Unexpected closing can leave hundreds of students

home alone when parents are at work. Therefore, we seek to make decisions on any mid-morning or afternoon arriving weather systems based on the best available forecasts at the last possible time frame.


- Evening Activities Canceled/Weekend Activities Canceled
  - o A storm <u>watch</u> does NOT cause a cancellation afterschool, evening, or weekend activities. A storm <u>warning</u> will cause such a cancellation.

#### When are decisions made?

- When possible, decisions are made the night before.
- When conditions require a delay in the decision, our goal is to notify you by 5:30am.


